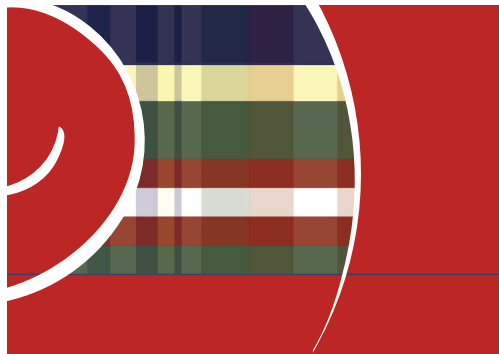
I look forward to seeing you at Smart Strokes 2010.

Dr Cherry Kilbride

PhD MSc MCSP

Lecturer in Physiotherapy, Centre for Research in Rehabilitation
School of Health Sciences & Social Care, Brunel University, Uxbridge, U.K

Dr Cherry Kilbride is currently a Lecturer in Physiotherapy at Brunel University West London, UK. Her background includes extensive experience working as a clinician and a manager in the National Health Service (1985-2005). Cherry completed her PhD in stroke rehabilitation in 2007 and her post doctoral work continues to centre on the field of stroke in health and social care settings.

Cherry has just stepped down from being Chair of the Association of Chartered Physiotherapists in Neurology, which one of the biggest special interest physiotherapy groups in the UK. She sits on the Intercollegiate Stroke Working Party at the Royal College of Physicians London who are responsible for the publication of national evidence based stroke guidelines and a national quality benchmarking audit in stroke (National Sentinel Stroke Audit), both of which are recognised as important drivers in continuing to improve the quality of stroke care.



Dr Dominique Cadilhac

Head of Public Health Division

National Stroke Research Institute, Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital, Melbourne

Dominique Cadilhac has been working with the National Stroke Research Institute since 1998 and has been involved in stroke research since 1994. Dominique has a nursing background, as well as a Master of Public Health and PhD. Dominique is responsible for the Public Health division work program. Her main focus of research has been health services evaluation related to the quality of acute care, patient and carer burden related to stroke, prevention of cardiovascular and chronic disease and economic evaluation in relation to optimal care pathways and interventions. Current projects include evaluating stroke care in Victorian and NSW hospitals; project managing the new Australian Stroke Registry; and determining the costs of lost production associated with a variety of risk factors for VicHealth. She is on the management and steering committees for a number of randomised controlled trials and on National Advisory Committees for stroke and cardiovascular disease prevention programs and hospital stroke audits. She also makes regular contributions to health policy in stroke and clinical guidelines.

In March 2010, she was recognised as the top ranked Research Fellow for Victoria by the National Heart Foundation.



Dr Jacinta Douglas

Associate Professor

School of Human Communication Sciences, La Trobe University, Victoria

Jacinta has qualifications in the disciplines of speech pathology, clinical psychology and neuropsychology. Currently, she is Associate Professor in the School of Human Communication Sciences at La Trobe University. She has extensive research and clinical experience in the rehabilitation of adults with stroke and traumatic brain injury. Jacinta's research interests involve evidence-based clinical practice, neurogenic communication disorders, and social participation and quality of life after acquired brain injury. She has presented frequently at international and national conferences and published numerous research articles and several book chapters. She is also co-editor of *Brain Impairment*, A Multidisciplinary Journal of the Australian Society for the Study of Brain Impairment.



Dr Simon Koblar

Senior Lecturer, Discipline of Medicine, University of Adelaide

Group Leader, ARC Centre for the Molecular Genetics of Development, Dept. Molecular Biomedical Sciences (Genetics)

Senior Consultant Neurologist, The Queen Elizabeth Hospital

Simon Koblar is one of Australia's leading stroke physicians. He is the Director of The Queen Elizabeth Hospital & University of Adelaide's Stroke Research program, a Senior Consultant Neurologist and Patron of Stroke SA, a community-based service for stroke victims.

He trained at the Royal Adelaide Hospital as a physician and followed up with neurology training at Guy's Hospital in London. He did his PhD in neurology at the Walter and Eliza Institute in Melbourne.

Associate Professor Koblar maintains a clinical practice, teaches undergraduate and postgraduate medical and science students, trains physicians in neurology and heads up a research group of 14 PhD and Honours students and postdoctoral researchers.

Over the past 10 years, Assoc Prof Koblar has been instrumental in setting up South Australia's stroke services. The state only has five stroke physicians and they have all been trained by Assoc Prof Koblar.

Workshop A

Optimising Community Participation After Stroke

Facilitated by: Annie McCluskey, Brenda Booth and Jennifer White

Community participation refers to any roles or activities that a stroke survivor wishes to engage in back in their chosen communities. During this workshop we will focus on out-of-home activities. Walking, using public transport, and resuming driving will be addressed, as well as social and leisure activities, paid and voluntary employment. Compensatory strategies for managing ongoing disabilities will be discussed including fatigue, reduced mobility, incontinence, communication and mood disorders. Self management programs will be described. Short presentations will be given by panel presenters followed by discussion.

Workshop B

Enriching the Stroke Recovery Environment: What's This All About?

Facilitated by: Heidi Janssen and Suzanne Stacey

Workshop Aims:

Enriching the environment of stroke survivors aims to enhance their opportunity to and subsequent engagement in physical, cognitive and social activities. How easy is this though to achieve within the clinical setting? We invite you to attend this thoroughly exciting stroke workshop to brainstorm possible barriers for activity participation experienced by our stroke clients and to also share and discuss ideas as to how we can overcome such obstacles.

This workshop aims to present not only the theory and evidence behind environmental enrichment, but to have lively discussions around: the role of recreational activities in this population, the importance of identifying individual patient interests and abilities, as well as logistical issues surrounding equipment security and infection control. Our aim is that following this workshop you will return to your clinical setting highly motivated and equipped with a heap of ideas on how to enrich your stroke clients' environment.

Essential items to bring along: Imagination (because we will be thinking outside the square!), writing materials to record all the wonderful ideas and a sense of humour.

Desirable items to bring along: Clinical examples of environmental enrichment and all associated pros and cons.

Workshop C

The Stroke Team: How Can We Be More Effective?

Be inspired to improve the effectiveness of the multi-professional stroke team

We invite you to participate in "The Stroke Team" workshop. Workshop D

Evidence-Based Practice: Is it Stuck in the "Too Hard" Basket?

Workshop Aims:

One quarter of patients who have a recurrent stroke will not survive the first month of this event. Most stroke risk factors are modifiable.

There are three main factors required for practice change. Firstly, clinicians need to be motivated, next they need to have the capability to change and, thirdly, they need the opportunity to change. This interactive workshop will discuss the importance of Evidence Based Practice in our clinical work and how to affect change. Please bring your own experiences (successes and failures) for discussion. We also will discuss the different types of evidence and how to distinguish between high quality evidence, poor quality evidence and opinion. The workshop aims to help give you confidence and beginning skills to decide whether one should change one's clinical practice based on the current available evidence and how to do this in your clinical setting. You will take away with you a list of resources you can use to continue to develop your skills in implementing Evidence Based Practice.

Workshop E

Stroke Research: What Do I Do With My Good Ideas?
